# Introduction to this morning's liturgy

The visit of the Diocesan Bishop is a highlight in any parish church's life. When the Bishop (in our case, the Archbishop and Metropolitan of the Province of Victoria) is present, the whole church is visibly gathered, with what many (rightly) see as a gathering of the four-fold order of ministry: People of God (*Laos Theou* – hence 'laity'), Deacon, Priest and Bishop. Each 'order' being present in fulfilment of the original vocation we all receive at baptism, and its development by the grace of the Spirit. For this reason, the dedication of a Font is solely reserved to the Bishop. Today, our recently restored Font will be rededicated, as will the pulpit.

When the Bishop is present she or he *must* preside at the eucharist – other priests always act 'vicar-iously', on behalf of the Bishop – because it is the Bishop, wearing the mitre (the sign of the Spirit being poured out on the whole Church), who reminds us that the Spirit gathers together the people of God in any place. The Bishop also assures the people of God, by her or his presence, of our union with the Church universal.

This sense of 'completeness' is symbolised by the presence of a seventh candle on the altar – seven being the Jewish number of completeness. It also provides a special foresight and foretaste of the heavenly liturgy (see Revelation 4:5 "in front of [God's] throne burn seven flaming torches, which are the seven spirits of God") which all the people of God share in eternally. Given the sense of light in the heavenly realms, today our Bishop rededicates the beautiful stained glass windows of this Church – which tell the story of the gospel's movement from Nazareth to the South Pacific. The generosity of many (especially legacies in honour of Eric Easton and Sir Reginald Sholl) has made this restoration possible, as has the careful, diligent oversight of Jenny Weller-Newton and Ravi Renjen.

Thus, it is especially appropriate that we have our Bishop with us today as we celebrate the Feast of St Michael and all the Angels. The Bishop's presence brings us a real sense of 'the whole company of heaven' – the church militant and triumphant – worshipping God, and rejoicing in the light and glory of the heavenly kingdom, for the coming of which we daily pray.

Setting of the eucharist:

Christ Church Mass Philip Matthias (b. 1954) Before the service, speak with God; during the service, let God speak to you; after the service, speak to one another.

Please stand as a bell is rung, and turn to face the Font.

The Archbishop and other ministers gather around the Font.

Archbishop: Repent and be baptized every one of you in the Name of Jesus Christ.

All of us who are baptized into Christ;

All: Have clothed ourselves with Christ.

Let us pray.

Father, we thank you that through the waters of Baptism, we die to sin and are made new in Christ.

We give you thanks that, as we are washed clean in the waters of Baptism, so this Font, through skilful work, has been cleaned and made new.

Grant through your Spirit that all who are baptized here may enjoy the liberty and splendour of the children of God; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

We rededicate this Font in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

The Archbishop censes the font, then blesses it with holy water, before we sing:

- Christ, the fair glory of the holy angels,
   Thou who hast made us, thou who o'er things rulest,
   Grant of thy mercy, unto us thy servants,
   Steps up to heaven.
- 2. Send thy archangel, Michael, to our succour; Peacemaker blessèd, may he banish from us Striving and hatred, so that for the peaceful All things may prosper.
- 3. Send thy archangel, Gabriel, the mighty;
  Herald of heaven, may he from us mortals,
  Spurn the old serpent, watching o'er the temples
  Where thou art worshiped.

#### Having reached the pulpit, the Archbishop says:

As was his custom, Jesus went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day and began to teach them.

Archbishop: Your word is a lantern to our feet:

All: And a light upon our path.

Archbishop: Let us pray.

Almighty God,

in every age you have spoken through the voices of angels,

archangels, prophets, pastors and teachers:

Purify the lives and lips of those who proclaim your holy Word

from this restored pulpit, which we rededicate today,

that your Word only may be proclaimed,

and your Word only may be heard;

through Jesus Christ, your Word made flesh.

Amen.

The Archbishop blesses the pulpit with holy water, before we continue the hymn:

- 4. Send thy archangel, Raphael, the restorer,
  Of the misguided ways of those who wander,
  Who at thy bidding strengthens soul and body
  With thine anointing.
- May the blest Mother of our God and Saviour, May the assembly of the saints in glory, May the celestial companies of angels Ever assist us.
- Father almighty, Son and Holy Spirit,
   God ever blessèd, be thou our preserver;
   Thine is the glory which the angels worship,
   Veiling their faces.

#### The Archbishop greets the gathered people of God:

Blessed be God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Blessed be God's Kingdom, now and for ever.

The Lord be with you And also with you.

The Archbishop reads the sentence, then calls all to prayer:

#### **Sentence:**

And all the angels sang, "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honour

and power and might be to our God for ever and ever! Amen".

c.f. Revelation 7:12

Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

### With the choir, all sing:

Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy. Christ have mercy, Christ have mercy, Christ have mercy. Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy.

#### The Deacon introduces the Confession:

We have come to Mount Zion, the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, to myriads of angels, to God, the judge of all, and to Jesus, the Mediator of a new covenant.

(c.f. Hebrews 12:22-24)

Silence is kept.

Let us then confess our sins to the Lord in penitence and faith, confident of God's forgiveness.

Merciful God,

All: our Maker and our judge,
we have sinned against you
in thought, word, and deed,
and in what we have failed to do:
we have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves;
we repent, and are sorry for all our sins.
Father, forgive us.
Strengthen us to love and obey you
in newness of life
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Archbishop pronounces Absolution, to which all respond

#### Amen.

### We sing together:

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

#### Let us pray.

The people pray silently; then the Archbishop 'collects' the silent prayer:

Everlasting God,
you have ordained and constituted in a wonderful order
the ministries of angels and mortals:
grant that, as your holy angels stand before you in heaven,
so at your command
they may help and defend us here on earth;
through Jesus Christ our Lord,
who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever. **Amen**.

# THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

Daniel 7:9–10, 13–14

A reading from the prophecy of Daniel.

As I watched, thrones were set in place, and an Ancient One took his throne; his clothing was white as snow, and the hair of his head like pure wool; his throne was fiery flames, and its wheels were burning fire. A stream of fire issued and flowed out from his presence.

A thousand thousand served him, and ten thousand times ten thousand stood attending him.

The court sat in judgement, and the books were opened. As I watched in the night visions, I saw one like a human being coming with the clouds of heaven.

#### The Sermon

After the sermon, silence is kept.

All stand.

Archbishop: Let us together affirm the faith of the Church:

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father [and the Son], who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy Catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

### THE REDEDICATION OF THE RESTORED WINDOWS

The Archbishop now proceeds to rededicate the restored windows:

Archbishop: I will make your windows of agates,

All: and all your borders of pleasant stones.

Look upon the rainbow, and praise him who made it:

How beautiful it is in its brightness.

Let us pray. (Silence is kept briefly)

O Lord God, the whole world is filled with the radiance of your glory:

Accept our offering of these windows, carefully restored

through the generosity of many

and the work of faithful coordinators and skilled artisans,

which we no rededicate to you for the adornment of this place

and the inspiration of your people.

Grant that as the light shines through them in many colours,

so our lives may show forth the beauty of your manifold gifts of grace,

through Jesus Christ our Lord, the Light of the World.

Amen.

The Archbishop now moves through the church, sprinkling the windows with holy water.

### THE GREETING OF PEACE

Please stand

Deacon: Hear again the song of the angels:

'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth, peace.'

Archbishop: The peace of the Lord be always with you.

And also with you.

Members of the congregation greet one another with a sign of God's peace.

# THE LITURGY OF THE SACRAMENT

During the following hymn, the people's gifts are brought forward, and the altar prepared.

The Archbishop offers prayers over the gifts, to which the people respond:

Blessed be God for ever.

The Archbishop then begins the Great Thanksgiving Prayer:

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The Archbishop continues the prayer, until:

In joyful gladness we unite our voices with theirs And sing the eternal hymn of your praise:

Holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The Archbishop continues the prayer until he says:

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died,

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

The Archbishop continues the prayer, which concludes:

...we worship you, Father, in songs of never-ending praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power are yours for ever and ever. Amen.

A brief silence is kept.

As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are confident to pray:

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.

Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.

Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours,
now and for ever. Amen.

#### THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE COMMUNION

As the Archbishop breaks the bread, the following is said:

As this broken bread was once many grains which have been gathered together and made one bread, so may your Church be gathered from the ends of the earth into your kingdom.

We sing:

Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us. Jesus, bearer of our sins, have mercy on us. Jesus, Redeemer of the world, grant us your peace.

The gifts of God for the people of God.

Come, let us take this holy sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ in remembrance that he died for us, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

Communion is distributed.

During communion, the Choir sings the following anthem:

Holy is the True Light, and passing wonderful, lending radiance to them that endured in the heat of the conflict, from Christ they inherit a home of unfading splendour, wherein they rejoice with gladness evermore.
