
A SERVICE OF LESSONS AND CAROLS FOR ADVENT: LOOKING FOR THE LIGHT

ABOUT THIS SERVICE

The cover of this Order of Service shows a young Jewish-Palestinian woman, in a room with little furniture and even sparser furnishings, sitting in some perplexity and trepidation at the bright light that dominates the room. Given the scene this is attempting to represent (as told in Luke's gospel, chapter 1) we know that young woman was living in a country under foreign domination, with exploitation and cruelty the order of every day. It is no wonder that the visitor she received had to reassure her in their conversation with "Do not be afraid"!

Looking at this image today seems especially heart-rending: given that we frequently see similar images on our televisions almost daily. I said "similar images": except that the images we see today show young women with fewer furnishings and usually lacking the solidity of the walls. And, I suspect, few of them see any 'bright light' shining, unless it is caused by an incendiary device. Of course, given events of just over a year ago, the same can be said for many young Jewish women living in their homes, or in tents at a music festival, before they were subjected to attack, sexual violence, kidnapping, death. Too many now remain trapped and held hostage in tunnels or buildings facing continual bombardment. Again, no "light" shining for them.

From the earliest days of the Church, Advent was a time in which the focus was waiting and preparing for the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ as universal judge and king at the end of time. The very name of the season "Advent" derives from the Latin for "to come" or "coming". This expectation of Jesus' second coming has its origin in Jewish apocalyptic thinking. As a long-persecuted race, yet deeply conscious of God's promises, 1st century Jews had a firm hope and expectation that Messiah would come, and the righteous – those faithful to God – would be vindicated, and set free or (in the teaching of the Pharisees) raised from the dead. There would be judgement – hence the rise of understandings of "The Last Judgement" in the Christian West – but it was, for Jews, primarily for the vindication of the righteous.

Tonight, in the midst again of turmoil, violence and a sense of despair, we hope in the promises delivered and believed during other times of anguish and despair. And we pray that the light of the world will dawn, a new kingdom of peace and light will come. Our presence tonight bears witness to that hope. We go from here to live as children of light (as St Paul puts it), that the world may see in us the hope it so desperately needs. In the famous words of one Advent hymn: "Arise, O Morning Star, Arise and never set." Before the service begins, the organist plays:

Nun komm der Heiden Heiland, BWV 659 by J.S. Bach (1685–1750)

During this, the Church building goes into darkness and the people keep silent, as we create a moment of 'waiting'.

The choir sings:

BIDDING PRAYER

In the name of God, who has delivered us from the dominion of darkness, and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son, we welcome you: grace to you and peace.

We are gathered together to proclaim and receive in our hearts the good news of the coming of God's kingdom, and so prepare ourselves to celebrate with confidence and joy the birth of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. We pray that we may respond in penitence and faith to the glory of his kingdom, its works of justice and its promise of peace, its blessing and its hope.

And as we seek to renew our allegiance to God's loving purpose, we pray for all who at this time especially need his pity and protection: the sick in body, mind or spirit; those who suffer from loss of dignity or loss of hope; those who face the future with fear, or walk in the shadow of death.

Finally, as we rejoice with the saints in heaven and on earth, we remember all who have gone before us with the sign of faith, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we offer up our prayers for the coming of his kingdom, in the words he himself has taught us, saying:

Our Father, Which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name... Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, But deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, For ever and ever. Amen.

Please sit.

The first candle on the Advent wreath is lit as the choir sings this prayer. The congregation is invited to join in the parts marked 'Full'.



Choir: You call all people to live by the light of faith, and to journey in the hope of your promised fulfilment.May we be obedient to your call and be ready and watchful to receive your Christ, a lamp to our feet and a light to our path.
